

Breast Cancer Screening

Breast Cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer and the second leading cause of death from cancer in women in the United States (after lung cancer). Although breast cancer is an important cause of cancer mortality in women under age 55, about half new cases developed and over half of deaths occur in women over 65. Although a family history in a first degree relative increases risk two to threefold, less than 10% of all breast cancer occurs in patients with a positive family history.

Screening tests for breast cancer include self-examination, clinical breast examination (doctors exam) and mammography. On 20 to 40 year old females self-examination is recommended monthly while clinical breast examination is recommended at least every three years. Yearly clinical breast examinations are recommended after the age of 40 with monthly breast self-examination. A mammogram is

recommended as a baseline between 35 and 40 and a yearly after 50. Mammography examinations are controversial between 40 and 50 years old, although most medical associations will recommend them after 40.

Mammography is the preferred test for early detection of breast cancer. With early detection of breast cancer there is a 25% to 30% reduction in mortality in women aged 50 to 69.

Since a mammogram is a test designed for screening, its specificity is poor and a large percentage of detected abnormalities are benign. When a screening mammogram is interpreted as abnormal, a diagnostic mammogram must be performed to determine the need for biopsy. Ultrasound can be used to clarify the nature of a nodular lesion. There is a standardized reporting system that helps to classify the results and guide for the need of further

evaluation. This system classifies mammograms into five groups, two of which are considered negative and one of which is considered highly suspicious for carcinoma. The system guides further management based upon the suspicious for malignancy and the presence or absence of palpable mass.

More aggressive screening for women with an increased risk might be warranted, although there is no evidence that supports this practice. BRCA 1 and 2 are genes that are tightly related with breast and ovarian cancer and about 85% and 60% lifetime risk is implied if present. But even a patient with a family history of breast cancer, 9 out of 10 patients will be negative for these genes. Therefore looking for these genes is not really helpful at this point.

In summary, it is important for all women over 20 to do self-exams monthly with a doctor's exam at least every three years; have a baseline mammogram between 35 and 40 then yearly after 50 with yearly doctor's exams. It cannot be stressed too much that early detection is the key to surviving breast cancer. ▼

Spiritually Speaking

The Rev. Dr. Jerry L. Seay is a former pastor in the Assemblies of God. He has been a pastor in the Metropolitan Community Churches since 1989. He and his life-partner of twelve years, Mike Lufriu, recently moved to Brevard County to start a new church, East Coast Metropolitan Community Church. East Coast MCC meets in Melbourne at the Unitarian

Universalist Fellowship (2185 Meadowlane Avenue) on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays of each month at 6 p.m. Services in Vero Beach are at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, 355 43rd Avenue on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of each month at 6 p.m.

History teaches us that most groups go through changes over the years. Sometimes the changes are good, sometimes they are not so good. Perhaps we begin with good intentions, but as we “grow” and “mature”, those in positions of leadership are tempted to develop guidelines that help keep them in power.

One of the most blatant examples of this is found in the beginnings of Christianity. Jesus treated all people as equals. Even the Apostle Paul wrote that in Christ all people are equal. There is no difference in genders with Christ.

As we read the development of Christianity in the Bible, women played major roles (despite what male religious leaders say). It

was the women who financially supported Jesus and his disciples as they traveled. It was the women and only one disciple who gathered at the place of the crucifixion. It was the women who went to the tomb of Christ on that first Easter morning. It was women who began some of the first groups of believers and formed them into churches.

Christianity is not the only religion where women played a major role in the beginning. Throughout the history of the Jewish faith, we find women in prominent positions. Let us not forget the Esthers, the Rahabs, the Sarahs, or the Deborahs.

It is my belief that true spirituality will involve all people without regard to one's gender. As we see a resurgent of spirituality in our nation, it is amazing to see how many of the new spiritual groups are led by women. It is refreshing to see denominations accept women into clergy roles. We have female rabbis, female clergy, female chaplains.

I have also noticed that many of the groups who empower women to be equal with men are also groups who support the GLBT community. I am proud to report that in my own denomination over 50% of our clergy are women. We see a large group of women in the clergy in the Unitarian Universalist and in the United Church of Christ.

Maybe we are once again returning to the real roots of spirituality as we set aside false notions of the superiority of one gender and once again begin to view **all people** as created in the image of God. ▼

What could be more important than customer appreciation? Club **Byrd Cage** kicks off the CA season with their event


